DIOCESE NEWS

Welcome back, we hope you had a good Easter break and wish you all the blessings of Eastertide. Following the sad loss of Pope Francis, we are sharing with you a message and a resource from CAFOD:

It is with sadness that we write to you following the death of Pope Francis. As the world mourns his passing, Pope Francis' legacy will be remembered as one that brought the Church closer to its mission of love, mercy and justice.

A constant source of hope and inspiration, Pope Francis has profoundly shaped the very mission and the whole life of the Catholic school community, moving a generation of children and young people throughout England and Wales to put their faith into action, to care for our world and for those in greatest need. There is no doubt that the impact of Pope Francis's words can be found in every Catholic school in the country. We at CAFOD have seen the tangible results, as you and your schools have engaged in responding to "the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor" through taking part in our climate campaigns, supporting the Big Lent Walk for many years, in solidarity with our sisters and brothers around the world, and in raising awareness of many aspects of our work that resonate with Pope Francis' teachings, from welcoming the refugee and stranger to campaigning for debt cancellation.

Pope Francis said that his own life story was a journey of hope. He understood that in a world that can feel scary or divided, God's love and the hope it brings is needed more than ever. In fact, he made hope the theme of this Jubilee year.

How poignant it is in this Jubilee year, as hundreds of thousands of children and young people in schools around or nations embark on their Jubilee journey, aspiring to his invitation to be pilgrims of hope, he is now passing the baton over to these trusted young hands.

Multi-Academy Trusts in the Brentwood Diocese

As you are aware, the Bishop set up an Academies Working Group (AWG) which has been meeting on a fairly regular basis to discuss the future plans for growing and developing Catholic Multi-Academy Trusts (CMATs) in Brentwood. The Bishop's vision for education has not changed; he wants all schools in the diocese to be part of a CMAT. This is in keeping with other Catholic Bishops across the country and a good number of dioceses already have full or nearly full academisation in their area. The original plan for Brentwood was to have 8 CMATs and we currently have 6 CMATs-although none are yet entirely full.

The AWG and the diocese recognise that the educational landscape has evolved and it is clear that MATs have to be a certain size in order to fully benefit financially and in relation to capacity to support improvement. In keeping with this, various CMAT models have been discussed. The group have recently been exploring models around 2, 3 or 4 CMATS. There has been a developing view that a smaller number of CMATS might be the most sustainable option. Further information will be shared as it becomes available and there is a planned CMAT Development Conference later in the year.

Religious Education Resources God and The Big Bang

(GATBB) has become a nationwide project, involving dozens of scientists of Christian faith, who have spoken to tens of thousands of students since its inception. In 2023 alone, the team visited more than 100 schools and interacted with more than 6500 9- to 18-year-olds.

The aim is to help students explore how faith and religion together helps us ask better questions in harmony with scientific knowledge and discovery through the lens of Christian spirituality and biblical faith. Many children don't always appreciate just how much the Church has been an advocate for scientific discovery throughout history and just how many amazing scientists were men and women of profound Christian faith.

The workshop aids the mission, identity and evangelisation role of the school by raising awareness of just how pro-science the Church is and has been as well as alerting young people to the risk scientism. [placing an excessive belief in the power of scientific knowledge and techniques] Students are challenged to think critically as they approach questions from both a scientific and faith perspective. The content is carefully tailored to the age and ability of the students taking part.

School Exclusions

Data in a joint report by the Ministry of Justice and Department for Education shows that the risk of being cautioned or charged for a serious violence offence by age 18 is <u>15 times higher</u> in children who had been excluded from school.

SEND

A <u>new report</u> has found a "crisis of lost learning" sweeping across schools in England. The Difference Education charity says children are missing out on the educational and social opportunities that come from learning in class, socialising with their friends, and gaining the skills and experiences they need to become successful adults.

DfE Guidance for Governors on SEND Oversight

Government Sets Out Plans to Target 'Stuck' Schools

The Secretary of State announced new plans to tackle forgotten schools as part of <u>proposals for a</u> <u>significantly strengthened school accountability system</u> that works for parents.

There are more than 600 'stuck' schools in England that have received consecutive poor Ofsted judgements, and which are attended by more than 300,000 children. Those attending these schools leave primary school with results 14 percentage points worse on average and secondary school with results a grade per subject worse on average.

Plans unveiled by the Education Secretary provide for a stronger, faster system, spearheaded by an initial £20 million investment in new regional improvement teams, known as <u>RISE teams</u> which will prioritise these stuck schools. They will draw up bespoke improvement plans with those schools, with government making up to £100,000 available initially to each school for specialist support. This compares to a £6,000 grant that was available previously for similar schools.

Ofsted Report Cards

<u>Ofsted has unveiled the new report cards</u> which they propose will evaluate schools across 9 separate areas. They also set out proposals for evaluating areas from 'exemplary' to 'causing concern', holding schools to a higher standard and providing far greater information for parents.

School Meals

Pupils eligible for free school meals (FSM) should be enrolled automatically, according to MPs [<u>BBC</u> <u>News</u>]

Data From the Office for National Statistics

New data from the Office for National Statistics suggest more young people were **not** in **work**, **education or training** at the end of 2024, than at any point in the past 11 years. [BBC News]

School Leaders Facing Abuse

Over 80% of school leaders face abuse from parents/carers, with 1 in 10 having been a victim of assault. Many leaders are at breaking point due to increasing hostility, with a poll of 1,600 members of the National Association of Headteachers revealing some leaders are subsequently struggling with anxiety and depression [Schools Week].

GOVERNOR DEVELOPMENT

Governor Vacancies - Please see the list of current vacancies

Chair and Vice Chair - Please note that only **Foundations Governors** can be appointed as the Chair or Vice Chair of a Governing Board.

Foundation Governors - In respect of the school or college for which a person is or is to be a Foundation Governor, he or she must not at any time be:

- related to any member of the school or college staff, teaching, or non-teaching;
- related to any governor whether elected, appointed, or ex-officio, of the school;
- employed (whether as a teacher or otherwise) at the school.

A person (other than the parish Priest) will not be re-appointed as a foundation governor of a particular school or college if he or she has just completed three terms of office on that particular governing body.

This message appeared in a July 2024 Friday mailing, and it has come to our attention that some schools are still not adhering to this. We will now be making contact with individual schools to ensure the situation is rectified.

Election Season: Who's Up for Re-Election?

With terms expiring and new faces joining, do you have a clear succession plan in place? A strong pipeline ensures stability and avoids last-minute scrambles. Think about succession across all key roles not just the obvious ones.

(TZA) v R, A Secondary School [2025) Court of Appeal - 4 March 2025

Unsuccessful challenge to child's exclusion from school; 15-year-old black Caribbean boy with SEN permanently excluded for serious assault, decision of HT was not unlawful for failure to comply with the Public Sector Equality Duty (PSED). Seriousness of the pupils conduct and/or harm of allowing them to remain will be such as to make no difference that they belong to a high-risk group or have received inadequate support in the past.

Supreme Court decision – legal definition of a woman – April 25

The Supreme Court argues that for the Equality Act to be consistent, the term woman has to mean a biological woman. That does not include biological males, even if they have certificates to say they have changed gender.

This means that where there are, for instance, women-only spaces, then a biological man who identifies as a woman cannot use them. That includes changing rooms, toilets, women's refuges, single-sex hospital wards and anywhere designated as for one sex only.

How much change that will mean in practice will be set out in detailed guidance. Until then, there remain lots of questions and some confusion - and that is challenging in an area where views are so polarised.

Safeguarding 2024/25 online Workshop – Monday 16 June 2025 5.30 – 7.00pm

Schools have a statutory duty to safeguard and promote the welfare of all pupils.

Are all your governors up-to-date with their statutory responsibilities around safeguarding? The statutory guidance <u>Keeping Children Safe in Education</u> (KCSIE) places an obligation on all governors and trustees to receive appropriate safeguarding and child protection training at induction and to ensure that their training is regularly updated.

This popular workshop will run as a webinar and cover all the essential information you need to understand your statutory responsibilities, focusing on the new KCSIE due to be published in the autumn term 2024.

It is so important that all governors are aware if their responsibilities for child protection and safeguarding, especially new governors as part of their induction and governors with a lead for monitoring safeguarding in their school.

Governor Induction

As well as in-school induction, it is important that new Governors attend induction training to gain confidence and knowledge of their role within a Catholic setting. Diocesan induction training consists of two modules and the expectation is that Governors attend both to complete their induction training. Whilst it is preferable to attend Module 1 first, they can be done in any order.

Module 1: The Distinctive Nature of Catholic Schools – 3rd June (5.00pm – 6.30pm)

This module explores the distinctive ethos of church schools and the role of governance within a Catholic setting.

CLERKS

It is important that full Governing Boards are clerked by a professional Clerk/Governance Professional rather than a school employee such as a Secretary, PA or Business Manager. We understand that there is a cost implication, but the Clerk carries out a significant role and where this is done professionally this will have real benefits for the Governors as well as avoiding any suggestions of a conflict of interest. As well as organising and minuting Governing meetings and supporting the Board with administrative tasks, such as record keeping, to make sure everything runs smoothly, a professional Clerk makes an important contribution to the efficient and effective functioning of a Governing Board by providing expert advice and guidance on a range of statutory and procedural matters to ensure efficiency and compliance. This includes working in partnership with the Chair to keep the Governing Body focussed on its core strategic priorities and providing independent advice on procedures, statutory guidance and policies and the annual tasks and decisions that need to be made.

Understanding Section 19 of the Education Act 1996

Review of the issues for schools and academies around the duty in section 19 of the Education Act 1996, which places a duty on local authorities to make arrangements for the provision of suitable education for children of compulsory school age who cannot attend school because of illness, exclusion from school or otherwise.
